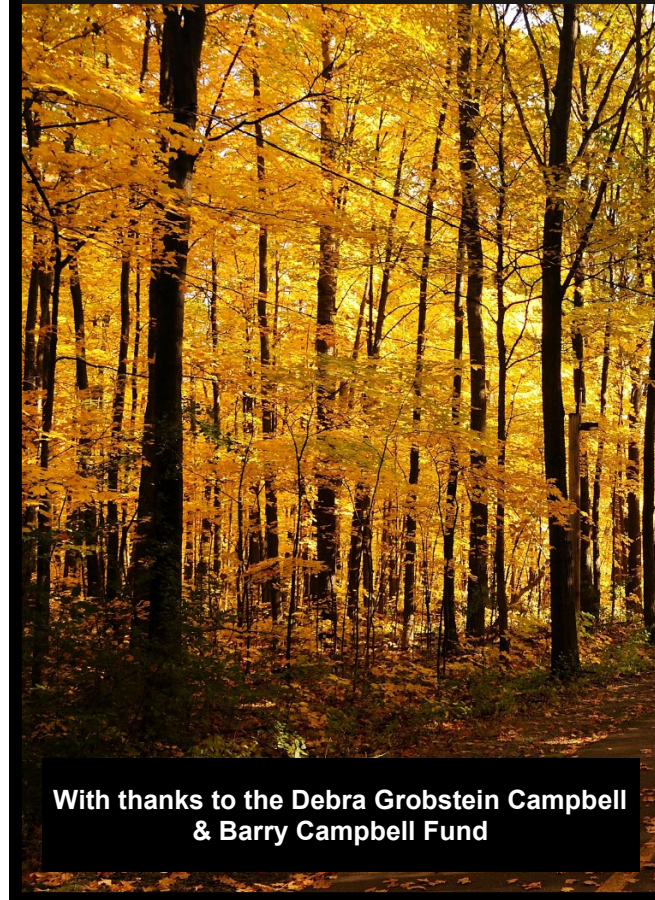

MINIMUM WRITING REQUIREMENT

All students must fulfill the **Minimum Writing Requirement*** by one of the three following methods:

1. Writing an essay** in a two-credit or three-credit course in which the essay constitutes no less than 75% of the final weight of grading assigned to the course, must be passed with a grade of C or higher; **OR**
2. Writing a term essay** must be passed with a grade of C or higher; **OR**
3. Writing an article, note or comment of equivalent substance that is published or accepted for publication in one of the following Law journals: McGill Law Journal, McGill Journal of Sustainable Development Law & Policy, McGill Journal of Law and Health, and approved by the Faculty Advisor of the Journal.

The work submitted in order to satisfy the Minimum Writing Requirement must be done independently, rather than by two or more students working together.

*The writing requirement is intended to involve independent research by the student on a topic largely developed by the student and to give rise to a written product that includes proper footnoting and a bibliography.

**The faculty guideline for papers is 10-15 pages per credit – a three-credit paper is meant to be 10,000 words, for example (roughly 40 pages at 250 words per page), exclusive of bibliography and footnotes. This can be shortened (minimum 8000 words) where there are additional assessments given in a course.
