

The 2008-2009 year has been incredibly busy with the discussions and planning activities related to the physical move of the School to a renovated mansion on Peel Street, which took place during summer 2009. You will



see in the next pages how beautiful our new space is, and how different it is from our previous location. We gained more offices for our professors, staff and students, and more space for meetings and conducting research. The School is very close to the Faculty of Education building where most of the classes are now taught. This is a new environment to which we are still adapting, but it is clearly the most beautiful home that the School has ever had. The year was also very hectic due to the preparation of the program presentation for the re-accreditation of the MLIS program by the American Library Association (ALA) and the preparation for the site visit by the External Review Panel in September. Re-accreditation is always an opportunity to assess and reflect on our achievements and strategic plans. The feedback from ALA will be very useful for discussing the changes that are needed in the curriculum and soon you will hear about our developments at the School.

The picture would not be complete if I did not mention our new formal doctoral program that began in September 2009. When talking with alumni, I realize that many of you do not know that we have 26 doctoral students, among whom are the five students enrolled in the formal program this year. We have experienced a growing interest in the doctoral program in information studies over the last few years as revealed by the number of applications received. Our students are increasingly successful at gaining doctoral fellowships. We celebrated our 17th doctoral graduate last year and all our graduates have successful careers both as professionals and academics.

Of course, many other events have punctuated the year. We were very pleased to welcome two international guest speakers in our Colloquia series. Nick Moore, visiting professor in information strategy at the University of Brighton, and Micheline Beaulieu, professor in information science at the University of Sheffield, both from the United Kingdom, came to discuss information issues with our students.

I am sure you are as busy as we are but hopefully you will find the time to enjoy this newsletter. As always, I wish you all the best and I look forward to hearing from you.

The School moved to 3661 Peel Street in August 2009, after 40 years in the McLennan Library Building.

This historic building on Peel was built in 1910 according to the design of Robert Findlay, a well-known Montreal architect, as the private home of Daniel Charles Macarow, general manager of the Merchants' National Bank. From 1923, it was owned by a series of prominent entrepreneurs and professionals, until its purchase in 1951 by the Soeurs de la Congrégation de Notre Dame de Montréal, to become a halfway house for people with social problems. In 1961, it was purchased by Marianopolis College - an undergraduate women's college - and served as the college library until being sold in 1976, along with adjoining property, to McGill. The College now operates as a junior college (CEGEP) in Westmount. Various McGill units have resided in the mansion

The building consists of four floors comprising 33 offices, a seminar room, and kitchen and storage facilities. The administrative services of the School are located on the first floor, along with the seminar room, which is used for small classes and to host events. Professors have offices on the second and third floors, and MLIS students and student groups have access to a number of rooms for study and meetings. Doctoral stu-

dents are housed throughout the building. The new Information Technology Laboratory is located in the adjacent Faculty of Education Building at 3700 McTavish. Depending on size, classes take place either in the seminar room at the School or in the Education Building.

The School will have an Open House during Homecoming Weekend in the fall of 2010, so plan to visit us!

FACULTY NEWS

NEW RESEARCH GRANTS AND AWARDS

professor Eun Park received a grant of \$75,000 from SSHRC's International Opportunities Fund to create an international network of researchers involved in developing AIDS prevention programs by using participatory visual data archives. This funding program is very competitive and provides one-year funding for international initiatives. Professor Joan Bartlett received a new FQRSC grant to conduct the analysis and evaluation of clinicians' identification and selection of information resources to support evidence-based practice (\$39,600 for three years). Professor Catherine Guastavino is involved in two new research projects as a team member. One project received funding from the Canada

Foundation for Innovation-New Initiative Fund (Alain Berry from Université of Sherbrooke as principal investigator; \$4,248,206 for five years), and the goal is to study vibroacoustics of large-scale, complex, multi-material structures in aerospace and terrestrial transport. The other project is funded by the European Cooperation in Science and Technology on Soundscapes of European Cities and Landscapes (J. Kang from Sheffield University as PI; \$600,000 for four years).

Professor France Bouthillier, also as a team member, will take part in two research projects. One project with Professor Shaheen Shariff (PI), from the

Faculty of Education, received funding from SSHRC (\$176,732 for three years). The goal is to develop an Interactive Virtual Forum to study children's online interactions and stakeholder responsibilities to promote cyber-safety in Canada among children, teachers, librarians and information technology companies. The other project with Professor Pierre Pluye and Roland Grad from the Faculty of Medicine received funding from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (Meetings, Planning & Dissemination Grant, \$24,961 for one year) to disseminate Cochrane e-mails and to use a method for assessing the value of information in French-speaking contexts.

INTERNATIONAL INITIATIVES

The School's involvement with the Indonesia Social Equity Project continued with Professor Jamshid Beheshti visiting Indonesia in February 2009 to deliver presentations on the promotion of library services in Jakarta, Yogyakarta and Makassar and on networking library services in Banda Aceh, reaching more than 80 librarians.

Professor France Bouthillier designed and delivered a workshop on Strategic Planning, Marketing and Information Literacy in academic libraries at the IAIN (State Institute of Islamic Studies) Ar-Raniry in Banda Aceh, Indonesia, in May 2009. Twenty-six participants from the region, both librarians and library staff, attended the workshop and developed strategic plans for their libraries. Professor Bouthillier is seen here with the librarian-translators for the workshop, Labibah and Miswan.

Professor Eun Park was involved in teaching sessions on the management of records and archives to a group of 30 Chinese civil servants who attended a program prepared by the Centre for Continuing Education at McGill in January 2009.



RE-ACCREDITATION OF THE MLIS PROGRAM

very seven years, the MLIS program is reviewed by the American Library Association (with the participation of the Canadian Library Association). The School's program, in its evolution from a diploma program through a BLS to the current MLIS, has been continuously accredited since 1929. Starting in 2008 with the establishment of the Ad Hoc Committee on Re-Accreditation, the School prepared a program presentation for submission in August 2009 to the Committee on Accreditation of the ALA, and hosted a site visit by the External Review Panel of the Committee on Accreditation in late September 2009.

The Ad Hoc Committee on Re-Accreditation contributed greatly to the creation of the program presentation, making themselves available for consultation and meetings on a regular basis. The committee was composed of all SIS faculty members as well as Jocelyne Andrews, MLIS'06, Head of Systems and Technical Services, Westmount Public Library; Anne-Marie Auger, MLIS'97, Consultant; Christine Hiller, MLIS'87, Project Officer, CREPUQ; David Fontaine, MLIS'08, Chef de division, Bibliothèque de Brossard; Lisa Milner, MLIS'91, Manager of Administrative Services; Eleanor London, Côte Saint-Luc Public Library and President of ABQLA; Theresa Rowat, University Archivist, McGill

University; Janine Schmidt, Trenholme Director of Libraries, McGill University; and Judy Silverman, Canadian Centre for Architecture.

The External Review Panel visited the School from September 20 to 23 and met with senior McGill administration, SIS faculty and staff, SIS students, and alumni. The report on the School has gone to the Committee on Accreditation and we expect to receive our re-accreditation decision in January 2010.

The site visitors were Andrew Dillon (Chair of the External Review Panel), Dean and Professor, School of Information, University of Texas at Austin; Michele Cloonan, Dean and Professor, School of Library and Information Science, Simmons College, Boston; Ann Curry, Director, School of Library & Information Studies, University of Alberta; Anne C. Moore, Dean of Libraries, University of South Dakota; Jennifer Paustenbaugh, Associate Dean of Libraries for Planning & Assessments, Office of the Dean, Oklahoma State University; and Joyce C. Wright, Associate Director of Library Development and Advancement, Associate Professor of Library Administration, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. The CLA observer was Karen Adams, Director of Libraries, University of Manitoba.

ICICKM 2009

The School sponsored the 6th International Conference on Intellectual Capital, Knowledge Management & Organizational Learning, held at McGill on October 1 and 2, 2009. This was the first international KM conference held at McGill and served to bring together researchers, practictioners and our own KM graduate students. The conference chair was Professor Kim Dalkir of the School, and the Program Chair was Professor Bouthillier. The keynote speakers were Dr. Yeona Jang of McGill's Desautels Faculty of Management, who discussed

"Working Smarter: When Knowledge Management, Organizational Learning, and Business Process Meet Together," and Dr. Jay Liebowitz, the Orkand Chair of Management and Technology in the Graduate School of Management and Technology at the University of Maryland University College. He spoke on "Cross-Generational Knowledge Flows in Edge Organizations." There were 120 attendees from over 20 countries worldwide. The 7th annual conference in 2010 will be held in Hong Kong.

The Dobson Cup offers a rare opportunity for budding entrepreneurs. The competition is open to new business ideas and not-for-profit start-ups. Teams present their ideas to a panel of experienced entrepreneurs and the projects are judged on innovativeness, growth potential and feasibility. The project presented by Ms. Pras and her colleagues was called FanSupported.com. FanSupported is an alternative to traditional record labels a social network site that allows artists to finance projects by raising funds from their fan base. In exchange, fan supporters receive incentives such as merchandise and personal engagement with their favorite artists. The award ceremony took place June 11, 2009. Amandine is also the recipient of an FQRSC doctoral fellowship.

Lorie Kloda, BA'98, MLIS'01, SIS PhD candidate, was selected as one of the two 2009 recipients of the Education Graduate Students' Society Doctoral Award for Research and Professional Excellence. This award recognizes an outstanding PhD student in the Faculty of Education who has demonstrated an aptitude for research and has made a contribution to the profession or the wider community.

SIS PhD candidate Vincent Larivière was awarded the 2009 Eugene Garfield Dissertation Scholarship from the International Society for Scientometrics and Infometrics (ISSI) for his ongoing doctoral thesis. He received the award during the 12th International Conference of the International Society for Scientometrics and Infometrics held July 14 – 17, 2009, in Rio de Janeiro. Started in 2006, his thesis is a bibliometric study of PhD students' contributions to science.

POST-DOCTORAL FELLOWS

This year, the School welcomed post-doctoral research fellows, Ilja Frissen (for a second year) and Sarah Payne, both of whom are working with Professor Catherine Guastavino.

Ilja Frissen started at SIS in June 2008 and continues to work under the supervision of Professor Guastavino in the Multimodal Interaction Lab, investigating perception-action coupling in hearing and haptics, and auditory perception of space.

Sarah Payne is an environmental psychologist and started her work at SIS in October 2009. Much of her research has

focused on urban public spaces and how the public interact with, and are influenced by, such spaces. Different users' perceptions, affects and cognitive evaluations of environmental features within a place are examined. Her research has examined people's fear of crime and preferred aesthetics in an urban park. Using a theory of affordances, she has also researched skateboarders' perception of urban street "skate-spots" in comparison to skateboard parks.

Sarah researches the affective and cognitive outcomes of visiting urban parks. In particular, she is assessing the psychological-

ly restorative benefits derived from visiting urban parks and how this varies depending on the perceived soundscape (sounds within a place). She has a mixed methodological approach and will be conducting experimental laboratory research, research *in situ*, as well as interviews to improve the language of evaluative items.

She did a Bachelor's degree in psychology at Sheffield University, a Masters degree in environmental psychology at the University of Surrey, and a PhD in architecture/environmental psychology at the University of Manchester.

From 1946 to 1965 Mary served as Librarian of Marianopolis College, with one of her major accomplishments being the re-establishment of its library in the former Macarow Mansion at 3661 Peel St., after its purchase in 1961 by the College. Since August 2009, the refurbished mansion – purchased by McGill in 1976 along with other adjacent Marianopolis buildings – has served as the home of the School of Information Studies, the irony of which would not have been lost on Mary!

In 1965-66, Mary served as Collections Librarian in the McGill Library. In 1966, she joined the faculty of what had become the Graduate School of Library Science as Assistant Professor, and in 1968 was promoted to Associate Professor. In addition, from 1966 to 1968 she also served as Librarian of the Library Science Library. Her 1973 receipt of tenure would be the

last granted to a member of the School's faculty until 1982. She resigned from the School in 1980, on a point of principle concerning the School's future direction. Her final years were spent in Montreal and the Toronto region.

Mary participated actively in the life of the School and the University. Among other activities, she served on McGill's Senate and its nominating committee. She was also an active member of professional associations, holding positions in the Canadian Library Association, the Quebec Library Association, and the Canadian Association of College and University Libraries. In addition to her publications on collections development, she assisted others in bringing their publications to light, particularly through the School's Occasional Publications series which she edited during its early years.

Many graduates will remember her as a superb classroom teacher with a notable ability to inspire students and impart wisdom. Her particular area of teaching interest was collection development, in addition to which she taught a number of other courses, including Research Methods. Indeed, she carried one of the heaviest teaching loads ever undertaken by a member of the School's faculty. As well, she supervised a significant number of student research projects.

Mary was deeply devoted to her immediate and extended family. We offer our condolences to her sister, Elizabeth Burns, and family. Mary Margaret Hall will be remembered as an excellent librarian, an outstanding teacher, and a person of strongly held principles.


CAREERS
