## **Based on Proximity and Synergy**


Normally we think the CBD is the city center. Historically, other centers were more prominent. Palaces and government buildings occupied places of importance at civic squares. Pre-industrial skylines were dominated by the church, the mosque or temple. The Agora in Greece was the center of athletic, artistic, spiritual and political life, a concentration of public buildings surrounding open public space. The Forum in Rome was a group of several important government buildings at the center of the city. Ebeneezer Howard's Garden City had a city center composed of a town hall, museum, hospital, library, theater, and concert hall all surrounded by a large park circular park.

Such centers are distinguishable from the CBD; they serve a different purpose.

Based on the premise that the **proximity** of social, educational, health, government, and humanitarian institutions can lead to beneficial **synergies** that will help release individual and social capacity, we will:

- Conduct a survey of historical and existing urban clusters of institutions; draw examples to the same scale, determine their program, and the size of city they served.
- 2. Decide on goals and program for such a center suitable for the needs of our time. Give this center type a name.
- 3. Prepare conceptual designs for such a center in a new city district, part of an expanding city in China.
- 4. Prepare conceptual designs for a new city center as part of a re-urbanization proposal for the City of Laval.



Patrick Geddes spoke of the proximity of institutions. Central to his beliefs was the intimate linking of spatial form and social processes.





"Civic Buildings should be grouped together .......'It has too often been the case, in the history of cities, that their Cultural Institutes have been postponed until adequate sites for them are no longer obtainable. Modern cities (British and American especially) are thus discovering their needs when too late adequately to supply them at great expense, and then in too scattered locations.'


His point is that it was vital to ensure the proximity of these institutes, so as to prevent their mutual forgetfulness, which in time hardens into exclusiveness, and thus to failure of usefulness all round: and just when duly intelligent and understanding and sympathetic cooperation are most required. This condition of proximity, and for mutual interaction, is fundamentally necessary.'
