Conference - Global Need for Formal Child Care Submission deadline: May 1

The need for formal child care is becoming a pressing global challenge. Dramatic economic changes have seen unprecedented rates of women participating in paid market work across the world. However, this fundamental transition in how women organize their lives has not been met by an equally dramatic transition in how children are cared for. Consequently, women across the globe are faced with tough choices regarding the trade-offs between work, personally caring for their children and using often substandard alternative child care arrangements. With much effort focused on improving work opportunities for women, policy efforts regarding child care have lagged.

This mini-conference will bring together stakeholders and scholars to focus on the tensions between women's work and child care, particularly as they relate to formal child care and women's outcomes. The event will highlight policy implications of research findings and will be relevant for academics as well as policy-makers and practitioners at local and international levels. We invite research from all disciplinary and methodological perspectives including empirical and theoretical contributions. Research from all geographic areas will be considered, although we are especially interested in work in resource poor settings. Thematic sessions will be determined based on submissions. To be considered for a presentation at the mini-conference, please submit an abstract of no more than 500 words. In addition to conveying the contribution to knowledge, policy relevance, findings and/or implications, your abstract should note the specific setting in question. 5th Community Social Pediatrics Symposium: Children's Vulnerability – Understanding and Addressing Health Inequities

May 25 & 26

The Community Social Pediatrics Symposium is a <u>Fondation du Dr Julien</u> initiative that is part of a collective effort to build on what we have learned from practice. It is a biannual event bringing together practitioners, scientists, academics, researchers and political decision-makers who wish to influence the ways in which we can help children at risk.

This year, the Symposium will focus on the many faces of vulnerability and will encourage discussions on various action plans. Indeed, society, the law and legislation, communities and families represent as many different realities as there are solutions. What does society think about vulnerable children? How do human rights and public policy help to reduce inequality in healthcare? Where are vulnerable communities located and how can we take into account their unique characteristics for optimal intervention? What frameworks and processes can we establish to ensure the long-term viability of our approach? What are the interventions that are adapted to at-risk communities and how can we measure their impact? Here are just some of the questions that will be raised during the 5th Symposium.

Research Seminar - Service Receipt for Individuals with Autism across Canada: Findings from a Canadian National Survey by Jonathan Lai

Caregivers face various challenges navigating the service sectors for their children with autism across the lifespan, leading to a high level of burden and distress in families. For example, the early developmental period is a sensitive window for clinical outcomes; however, it is not known how access to early intervention relates to receiving other services later as the child ages. Further, there is pressing need to understand the dynamics of service utilization through

the emerging adulthood period for these children after leaving secondary school. In this presentation, various sociodemographic, clinical and systemic factors will be explored as mediators of service access in children and emerging adults using data from a pan-Canadian survey completed by 3251 caregivers reporting on 3317 family members with autism. Results and discussion of relevant factors including intellectual disability status and contextual factors (such as being in school or work) on how services are accessed will take place.
