CAUT and FQPPU updates

CAUT

The July issue of CAUT's Facts and Figures is available on-line in the <u>members only</u> section of the CAUT website (id: MAUT; pw: #Mcg1II). This edition provides an overview of the current bargaining climate, summarizes recent settlements in the postsecondary education sector, and includes updates to a model clause approved at April 2015 CAUT Council.

The CAUT has waded into the federal election fray with a special Get Science Right! Election Kit containing the main points of its ongoing campaign to improve science funding and organization in Canada. It can be accessed online by logging in to the <u>members only</u> section of the CAUT website (id: MAUT; pw: #Mcg1II).

The CAUT is holding its 5th Forum for Aboriginal Academic Staff in Winnipeg on November 6-7. In light of the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Report (TRC) this year's Forum will allow participants to collectively consider: the implications of austerity measures on Aboriginal academic staff and Indigenous Studies programs; what academic staff associations can do to promote Indigenous Knowledge and support Aboriginal academic staff; and how to build inclusive academic cultures. The CAUT has issued a memo warning members of the possibly harmful effects of commercial course content websites such as OneClass and Course Hero which sell course materials, without permission of the professor, to students. This practice raises serious copyright and quality issues that university administrators will have to address. Report: CAUT Forum for Chief Negotiators

(Ottawa, 27-29 March, 2015)

The theme for this annual CAUT forum was 'Talking about money in a time of austerity.' While compensation for academic staff has always been a central concern at the negotiating table with university administrations, global economic uncertainty since the 2008 financial crisis has continued to place budgetary pressure on virtually all aspects of university operations. Given this broader context, negotiating salary compensation has become more complex in a period of dwindling federal and provincial budgets that have witnessed severe cuts to higher education, particularly universities.

Through a series of presentations (on 'Equity in total compensation,' 'Monetary Strategy,' 'Costing the Association's Proposals,' 'How do we Judge Compensation Improvement?,' and 'Creative Salary Negotiations') and workshops this forum aimed to explore the discourse of austerity, its implications for academic salary bargaining, and how it might be challenged by academic representatives involved in negotiations on compensation. However, the overarching theme of the forum was set by Angella MacEwan (senior economist for the Canadian Labour Congress) and Sylvain Schetagne (CAUT Associate Executive Director for Research & Advocacy). In their presentations MacEwan and Schetagne argued that governments and media present the concept of austerity as a purely technical or financial exercise focused on balancing budgets and "getting the economy back on track." They went on to note that this needs to be countered, as the actual aims and objectives of the discourse on austerity are deeply implicated in a neoliberal agenda aimed at cutting public expenditure on education, health and welfare, while also intensifying social and economic inequalities that ultimately benefit the wealthiest in society (e.g. through tax cuts). Thus, challenging the discourse of austerity is as much about defending employees' rights to fair and equitable compensation for their work, as it is about refusing a political agenda that continues to insidiously undermine the provision of public services in the lives of Canadians.

Basic science funding in Canada: a threat to McGill that needs a university response

McGill researchers understand that we have reached a critical juncture in the idea of curiositydriven research. This may be particularly true for the biomedical sciences. The drive and desire to understand things for their own sake is being altered, shaped and pushed toward the application of such discoveries. Critical to an understanding of disease and to the development of new therapies and preventive measures, basic biomedical science is deeply rooted in the history and success of modern medicine. The need for continued curiositydriven research is essential to future discoveries as well. However, the push to apply discovery not only interferes with a desire to understand, it also means we end up applying our discoveries too early. In this article, we explore several problems associated with the push to apply research at the expense of basic science.
