For the most part, English is the primary language of instruction at our partner institutions in Hong Kong; however, not all courses are in English (each partner places a certain emphasis on offering courses taught in Chinese).

Proof of English Proficiency

McGill students are exempt from having to prove English Proficiency as part of their exchange application.

China, Japan, Korea (Republic of), Taiwan, Thailand

Classes are taught primarily in the official language of the country the partner institution is located in. However, each partner – to varying degrees – provides students with the opportunity to study in English. Please note that this does not necessarily mean that a partner's course offerings will be suitable for you and your program requirements at McGill. If you are interested in going on exchange to a school in any of the above countries (especially if you aren't proficient in the language commonly used in that country), it is imperative that you consult the host's course catalogue!

Proving Language Proficiency

Demonstrating proficiency in a language other than English could come in the form of:

- Completion of intermediate (or advanced) level-studies of the language in a college setting.
- Graduation from a secondary or post-secondary institution where classes were taught primarily in the requested language.
- A letter from a McGill professor capable of assessing your level of proficiency in the relevant language.

(Note: Individual institutions may have additional requirements)

- A Valid Passport
 - Most exchange partners in this region will request a scanned copy of your passport *before* reviewing your application. Your passport **must** be valid for at least six months after your scheduled return. If your passport is expiring soon, think about renewing it.
- Reference Letter
 - Many of our Asian exchange partners will ask that you submit one or more letters of reference (from a McGill professor). Asking a professor to write a reference letter for you can be daunting, so start thinking about who you might ask!
- A Medical Examination (sometimes with specific requirements)
 - A common application item from schools in this region is that the student provide a recent medical certificate, signed by a physician. Fulfilling the requirements found on these certificates – especially if you are an international student at McGill and/or do not have access to a family doctor in Montreal – can be tricky (and expensive). Some schools require that the student provide recent chest x-ray photos. Do not expect that you will be able to get this certificate signed by the McGill Exchange Office or Health Clinic.
- Bank Statements/Financial Documents
 - Partner schools will often ask that applicants provide evidence that they will be able to support themselves financially throughout their stay.

I've been accepted, what must I do before departure? Apply for any relevant immigration documents.

- For countries in this region, your citizenship can greatly impact whether or not you will need to apply for a study permit and/or what type of study permit you should be applying for.
- If you are unsure about whether you will require immigration documents to study in Asia, contact the host institution and/or Embassy/Consulate of the country that you will be travelling to.

Make sure that you have the appropriate health and travel insurance

• Your host school will advise you on this matter after you've been accepted.
