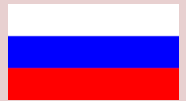

Things to Consider

Language of Instruction

The vast majority of our European partners are located in countries where English is not the primary language (Ireland and the UK being the exceptions); however, many of these institutions offer a wide-range of courses taught in English.

If you are interested in going on exchange to Europe, but would only be comfortable following lectures taught in English, check out our partner institutions located in:

Czech Republic, Denmark, Hungary, Ireland, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Spain, Sweden, Turkey, Israel

Partners not located in the above countries may still offer courses taught in English; however, you should confirm this by consulting the partner's course catalogue.

Proving Language Proficiency

Some schools may require that applicants demonstrate proficiency in a language other than English. Proof of language proficiency could come in the form of:

- Successful completion of intermediate-level studies of the requested language (at a post-secondary level).
- You graduated from a secondary or post-secondary institution where classes were taught primarily in the requested language.
- A letter from a McGill professor capable of assessing your level of proficiency in the language.

(Note: Individual institutions may have additional requirements)

The Host Application: Europe

I've accepted my nomination to a partner school located in Europe; what documents will I need to apply to the host institution? Are there any supporting documents that I should prepare well in advance?

Documents to Prepare in Advance: Europe

- A Valid Passport
 - Most exchange partners will request a scanned copy of your passport *before* reviewing your application. Your passport **must** be valid for at least six months after your scheduled return. If your passport is expiring soon, think about renewing it.
- Reference Letter
 - Many of our European partners will ask that you submit one or more letters of reference (from a McGill professor) as part of your application. Asking a professor to write a reference letter for you can be daunting, so start thinking about who you might ask!
- Proof of Language Proficiency (*see above*)

I've been accepted to the host, what must I do before departure?

• Apply for any necessary immigration documents

In the European Union, your citizenship can greatly impact whether or not you will need to apply for a study permit and/or what type of study permit you should be applying for.

If you are unsure about whether you will require immigration documents to study in Europe, contact the host institution and/or the Embassy/Consulate of the country that you will be travelling to. Do not take the advice of a friend, as their circumstances may be very different.

• Make sure that you have the appropriate health and travel insurance

Your host school will advise you on this after you've been accepted.

(Note: Please do not apply for any applicable immigration document until your exchange application has been accepted by the host.)
