- Background: This fellowship will provide Transcultural Psychiatry clinical training in community clinic settings (CLSC's) located in multiethnic neighborhoods, as well as at the Cultural Consultation Service of the Jewish General Hospital.
- Research activity ongoing research with faculty at the CSSS de la Montagne and the Culture and Mental Health Research Unit
- Publications The fellow will be expected to produce at least one paper for publication during the year.
- Mission: To provide research and clinical training in Child Transcultural Psychiatry. The clinical fellowship's general objective is to master Transcultural Psychiatry skills. Specific skills that will be addressed are: performing cultural assessments and cultural formulations; working with interpreters and culture brokers; and learning how to do cultural consultations for other healthcare professionals. The research fellowship objectives include: To become familiar with the literature in social and cultural psychiatry; to learn about cultural validity issues in all steps of the research process, and to participate in transcultural research. Research training will be comprehensive, from formulation of a research question to analysis of results.
- Outline how intended fellowship will enhance residency training: This fellowship will
  provide clinical and research training in Transcultural Psychiatry. Fellows will receive
  clinical supervision in Transcultural Psychiatry consultation and treatment at primary,
  secondary, and tertiary levels of care. Training is provided in both adult and child
  psychiatry. Training opportunities in collaborative care with pediatricians, family
  physicians and allied mental health care professionals is provided. Family focused
  evaluation and treatment is highlighted.
