A. SOCIAL SCIENCE COMPLEMENTARY COURSES

90-credit BSW students need to take 18 credits of “Social Science Complementary Courses”. For courses in other departments, you must respect all the restrictions and pre-requisites listed in the course calendar. If you need an instructor’s permission to register for a course, you must speak to the instructor in that department and go through their administrative office to get an override to register. Permission must be obtained prior to course registration.

B. ELECTIVE COURSES

Students entering the 90-credit BSW as of Fall 2016 need to take 6 credits of Electives. Those who entered the BSW prior to Fall 2016 need to take 6-9 credits of Electives. Elective courses are 200+ level (U1 students may take up to two 100-level courses, one per term), non-social work, university credit courses from any academic Faculty and any department. For example, all Arts, Law, Management, Medicine, Music, Religious Studies, Science courses can count as elective courses.
