Course Description: This course provides an overview of the foundations for professional practice in order to help students develop the foundational knowledge and skills required for the upcoming clinical practica courses, and future OT/PT practice in the public and private healthcare sectors.

To achieve this, we will incorporate a study and analysis of the various systems which impact the role of the occupational and physical therapists in health service delivery settings. Based upon the context of rehabilitation, health promotion and disability prevention, this course will consist of multiple sections including:

- healthcare environments and systems
- professionalism and ethics (interpersonal, organizational and policy levels)
- management, safety (patient and therapist)

These topics will be considered at the international, national, provincial, and local levels.

Course Structure: This course is delivered in three different ways. First, there are three hours of class per week, typically in lecture format. Secondly, there are three, 90-minute group mentoring sessions with expert clinicians to facilitate the integration of 3 topic areas: (1) health care systems, (2) professionalism and ethics; and (3) management and safety. As part of the management and safety topic area, a hands-on component (2 sessions of 2 hours) is also provided where students will apply the principles of moving patients safely (*Principes de déplacement sécuritaire des bénéficiaires*) pertaining to the area of patient/therapist safety.

Instructor Message Regarding Remote Delivery: We acknowledge that the COVID-19 pandemic has led to different challenges for everyone. We aim to deliver this course in a way that is inclusive and offers flexibility. In order to do this, we will be providing a mix of asynchronous



(audio-recorded) lectures as well as synchronous/live lectures via Zoom. For synchronous/live lectures, we will do our best to record them so that those who cannot attend, will have access to this content. Please note that the hands-on component related to the principles of moving patients safely will be conducted in-person. We encourage students to communicate with us if they are experiencing any concerns related to the course activities we have listed above.

Health care environments and systems

Understand the different healthcare settings involved in the health care continuum.

Analyze how structures of healthcare systems affects rehabilitation services, including services for indigenous population.

Analyze social, economic and political factors that shape the provision of OT/PT services and health promotion, and experiences of disability.

Professionalism and ethics

Understand the professional regulatory bodies of OT/PT in Quebec

Apply principles of professionalism and professional codes of ethics

Apply the principles of effective teamwork with colleagues, clients, and other stakeholders.

Critically appraise ethical issues in rehabilitation.

Management and safety

Apply principles of health promotion and safety (including body mechanics).

Critically appraise the principles of OT/PT advocacy in practice domains.

Apply attributes and competencies related to OT/PT profiles of practice.
