Course Objective: To prepare students for learning in clinical practicum 3 and 4, review clinical profile, and prepare for entry to practice.

Course Structure: Interactive and reflective fieldwork seminars will be interspersed with the clinical course dates in term A (fall) M1, and term B (winter) M1. The clinical seminar program consists of required seminars for approximately 15 hours.

1. Evaluate personal strengths and areas for improvement in performance during OCC1 501 and 502 in order to prepare for learning in OCC1 503 and 602.

- 2. Describe OT practice in different settings and reflect on their personal style/fit within different organizational cultures.
- 3. Reflect on key experiences shaping their OT identity through the use of photovoice.

Collaborator and Professional:

- 4. Actively participate in clinical learning profile planning based on personal reflection.
- 5. Continue to refine peer learning techniques through giving and receiving peer feedback.

Professional:

- 6. Monitor and revise personal learning objectives.
- 7. Complete a student professional portfolio.

Practice Manager and Professional:

- 8. Prepare for licensure for practice.
- 9. Explore strategies to assist with employability upon graduation.

Communicator:

10. Continue to refine documentation techniques needed within various sites.

Practice Manager and Scholarly Practitioner:

11. Prepare for future mentoring/teaching role in practice.

Scholarly Practitioner and Change Agent:

12. Discuss the OT role in the healthcare system and advocate for change.
