The Sustainability, Maintenance, Repair, and Social Justice in Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies: A Speaker and Workshop Series asks questions about sustainability, maintenance, right to repair, and the power of speculative futures. The series will be divided into 3 major themes: (1) Challenges for Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies; (2) Sustaining Social Justice: Sustainability (Environmental), Right to Repair, and Maintenance; and (3) Toolkits: Workshops Applying the Lessons of the Speaker Series. These questions are at the heart of the sustainability grant. By thinking about sustainable technologies through the lens of social justice, the speakers of this series will foreground the environmental and social impact of the technologies we build. Environmental racism and sexism will be addressed.

Sustainability, Maintenance, Repair, and Social Justice in Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies: A Speaker and Workshop Series, which will address these questions, is timely as Montreal grows into "the world's leading Artificial Intelligence and Deep Learning Hub" (Lindeman, 2017) and McGill University is a leader in that research. Samsung, Facebook, Google Brain, Element AI, and Microsoft all have or are developing AI campuses within the city. In 2017, the Forum on the Socially Responsible

Sustainability, Maintenance, Repair, and Social Justice in Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies: A Speaker and Workshop Series of 2020 and 2021 will build on my previous speaker and workshop series "The Feminist and Accessible Publishing, Communications, and Technologies Speaker and Workshop Series," which sought to bring together scholars, creators, and people in industry working at the intersections of digital humanities, computer science, feminist studies, disability studies, communications studies, LGBTQ studies, history, and critical race theory. The series, which was funded by a 14,012 SSHRC Connection Grant, brought forward critical approaches to publishing



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practices, innovative communication strategies, and techniques for making research dissemination more accessible. This project develops those themes further and focuses on how to make the proposed ideas raised in the previous series sustainable.

That series included over 25 events including presentations by: the co-founder of the AI Now Institute, Meredith Whittaker on AI and Social Justice; Abigail Echo Hawk on Decolonizing Data; Dr. Lauren Klein on Data Feminism; journalist and filmmaker, Astra Taylor, on Technology, Publishing, and Power; Oglala Lakota performance artist, Suzanne Kite, on Indigenous Protocols for AI; Dr. Ruha Benjamin on The New Jim Code and Race After Technology; Dr. Rumman Chowdhury on Algorithmic Colonialism; Nigerian-American data artist, Mimi Onuoha, on Missing Data Sets; and much more (disrupting disruptions.com for a full schedule).

While that series raised important questions (eeks to bring together scholars, creators, and people in industry working at the intersections of digital humanities, computer science, feminist studies, disability studies, communications studies, LGBTQ studies, history, and critical race theory, the Sustainability, Maintenance, Repair, and Social Justice in Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies: A Speaker and Workshop Series, takes the work to the next level. Part 2 will build on the themes of Part 1 but will also ask questions about sustainability, maintenance, right to repair, and the power of speculative futures. The series will be divided into 3 major themes: (1) Challenges for Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies; (2) Sustaining Social Justice: Sustainability, Right to Repair, and Maintenance; and (3) Toolkits: Workshops Applying the Lessons of the Speaker Series.

The above 5 talks (of which 4 I am requesting funding support for) are part of the larger 2020/2021 series that will consist of 20 events over 18 months (dependent on funding-- however all of the speakers have committed to participating if the funding is obtained). As explained above, the lectures are filmed and housed on the series youtube channel and website. This series will lead to a more formal academic publication, as well. I am currently working with editor Geoffrey Little of Concordia University Press to produce an open access publication about the speaker and workshop series, tentatively entitled "The Challenge of Feminist and Accessible Publishing and Communications Technologies." The manuscript will be delivered in 2020 and will highlight the issues around sustainability.
