This year, we celebrated the reopening of the Schulich Library of Physical Sciences, Life Sciences, and Engineering—a significant milestone for our community—and successfully transferred 2.4 million books to the new McGill University Collections Centre.

The year also brought important organizational changes. Realigning our library units and functions has helped us better meet operational needs and advance our long-term goals. We outlined new strategic priorities focused on Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, Accessibility, and Indigenous Initiatives to support Reconciliation. Additionally, an external review of the McGill University Archives (MUA) resulted in a set of recommendations that led to the transfer of responsibility for MUA to the Secretariat on September 1, 2024, creating efficiencies in McGill's archival management.

Our librarians continued their essential work, offering expert support to McGill's students, faculty, staff, and visiting scholars. This year's workshops covered a wide range of topics, from artificial intelligence to digital scholarship.

McGill University Libraries are the intellectual heart of campus, supporting research, learning, and discovery. Our spaces and collections are open, accessible, and ready to serve the entire McGill community and beyond. I welcome feedback and invite you to reach out with any ideas or suggestions.

None of this would be possible without the support of our donors and the dedicated efforts of our library staff. Please join me in thanking them for their commitment to excellence. Together, we look forward to inspiring and supporting the McGill community in the years ahead.

 – Racchana Ramamurthy Post-Graduate Students' Society (PGSS) University Affairs Officer In the fall of 2023, the renovated Schulich Library of Physical Sciences, Life Sciences, and Engineering in the Macdonald-Stewart Library Building reopened its doors after significant structural repair and restoration. The six-storey heritage building known for being the spot where Ernest Rutherford pursued successful experiments which were to win him the Nobel Prize, now features more natural light, newly exposed architectural details embedded in the red stonework, and a variety of study and work areas totaling 800+ seats. Spaces are equipped with the latest technology making Schulich Library a prime destination that embraces the spirit of inquiry and the pursuit of knowledge that McGill University stands for.

## **2.4 MILLION BOOKS, ONE HISTORIC MOVE:** McGill's Cutting-Edge Collections

Centre Sets New Standard in Library Innovation and Preservation

During the 2023-2024 academic year, 2.4 million books moved off-campus to the newly built McGill University Collections Centre (MUCC). This groundbreaking facility marks a historic milestone as McGill's first-ever design-build project and sets a new standard for library preservation and sustainability in Quebec. Located in Valleyfield, the 4,200 square metre state-of-the-art facility features a revolutionary automated retrieval system that holds 3 million books. The building incorporates advanced robotics and a unique grid-like aluminum retrieval structure, making McGill University Libraries the only library system in the world to utilize the AutoStore<sup>®</sup> system for the storage, preservation, and retrieval of books.

Hundreds of staff members were involved in this multi-year project. From planning to prepping materials, construction to systems testing, the meticulous care and expertise brought to this endeavor is a significant milestone for McGill and Quebec, enhancing library infrastructure and setting new standards for service. This book move is the first phase of a plan to nearly double study and workspace in the McLennan-Redpath Library Complex and other library spaces for the McGill community.

## UNVEILING DAWSON'S LEGACY:

McGill Digitizes Over 100,000 Pages of Historic BC Land Surveys and Indigenous Encounters

Thanks to a generous gift from an anonymous donor and a grant from the British Columbia History Digitization Program, fragile materials by renowned Canadian geologist George Mercer Dawson are now publicly accessible. Spanning 1871-1901, this digitized series, part of McGill University Archives, documents Dawson's land surveys of Northern BC. Over three years, 68 boxes of letters, diaries, notebooks, and drawings were manually scanned, totaling over 112,715 pages. These items are available online via McGill's Archival Collections Catalogue (AtoM).

McGill University Archives is the first non-BC institution to receive this grant, which promotes access to BC's historical resources. The collection holds scientific observations on Northern BC's mineral resources, botany, and geography, along with Dawson's personal correspondence and diaries detailing encounters with Indigenous communities, particularly the Haida People. Dawson's explorations also provide the first written record of Queen Charlotte's Island, now Haida Gwaii, and earned him the honour of having Dawson's Creek named after him. 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## RARE VOLTAIRE MANUSCRIPTS ARRIVE AT MCGILL:

A Landmark Addition to One of North America's Top Enlightenment Collections

In the fall of 2023, an exceptionally rare collection of handwritten papers related to Voltaire—the renowned French Enlightenment author, philosopher, satirist, and provocateur—was deposited with Rare Books and Special Collections (RBSC). This legacy gift complements the RBSC's already outstanding variety of rare books and manuscripts by Voltaire, enhancing its significant holdings on the Enlightenment and positions McGill's holdings as one of the most significant Voltaire repositories of books and manuscripts in North America.

The Jacqueline Lambert-David Voltaire Collection comprises 1,500 pages of handwritten manuscripts, many penned by Voltaire himself. It includes letters, poems, memoirs, notes, legal documents, and trial testimonies many over 200 years old and previously unpublished. Some manuscripts are formal documents bearing Voltaire's signature and seal, while others reveal his editorial process, with crossed-out text, replaced words, and notes in the margins.

The Collection was donated by Professor Peter Southam, a member of Canada's Southam newspaper dynasty and a retired history professor from the University of Sherbrooke. Named after his mother, the collection reflects his family's ownership of Voltaire's former estate and their periodic acquisition of related documents. McGill Libraries possess many, many treasures, and among them, one of the greatest research collections of Voltaire's books and manuscripts anywhere in the world."

### **75 YEARS OF HUMAN RIGHTS:** John Peters Humphrey's Archives Added to Canada Memory

of the World Register

To commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights' adoption on December 10, 1948, McGill University Libraries and the Canadian Commission for UNESCO were proud to announce the addition of John Peters Humphrey's archives to the Canada Memory of the World Register. This archive features the first handwritten draft of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, along with typed subsequent versions authored by John Peters Humphrey (1905-1995), a Canadian law professor and human rights advocate. The archive also includes Humphrey's personal diaries, correspondence, speeches, and lecture notes, providing insight into his views on Canada's roles and responsibilities in promoting human rights. His work as a human rights advocate is encapsulated in his belief: "There is a fundamental link between human rights and peace. There will be peace on earth when the rights of all are respected."

## FORGING ANEW STRUCTURE


to Strengthen Services and Future Growth

In November 2023, a new structure was implemented to better align with McGill Libraries' strategic priorities. This reorganization was shaped by valuable input from librarians and staff, ensuring that it addresses both the current and future demands of our users.

During the 2023-2024 academic year, all staff led by the senior management team undertook an exercise to identify:

- 1) strategic priorities (key areas of focus)
- 2) library objectives to be attained in the coming three years within the respective strategic priority
- 3) a detailed list of annual activities to be undertaken in 2023-2024 to achieve the respective objective

In addition, a comprehensive review of the McGill University Archives (MUA) was conducted at this time. A report with recommendations was submitted by two external consultants in winter 2024. After careful consideration, President and Vice-Chancellor Saini and Provost and Executive Vice-President (Academic) Manfredi proceeded with the implementation of the recommendations stemming from this review, which include a transfer of responsibility of the McGill University Archives from the Libraries to the Secretariat, effective September 1, 2024. This organizational change aims to streamline operations and enhance the management of McGill's records and archival resources.



percentage of staff members are participating in a project As part of the organizational restructuring and strategic planning initiatives, a new division-Strategic Initiatives-was established to drive key transformational efforts across the library system. Associate Dean Jenn Riley was appointed to lead this division, which plays a vital transversal role in uniting initiatives from various areas of the library system. Central to its mission is bolstering awareness and making substantive progress in enhancing equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility (EDIA) within our services, spaces, collections, and workforce. The second focus for the new division is placed on advancing Indigenous Initiatives, with a mandate to coordinate and align existing projects and take concrete steps toward Reconciliation. During the 2023-2024 academic year, the division's priority was to establish two working groups tasked with developing preliminary action plans that outline key projects and next steps in these critical areas. The McGill University Libraries Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Accessibility Action Plan and Indigenous Initiatives action plans are now available online.

### SHEDDING LIGHTON 19<sup>th</sup>-CENTURY FEMALE NATURALISTS: McGill's Gwillim Project Explores Art, Letters, and Empire in Madras

In the fall of 2023, the book *Women, Environment and Networks of Empire*, edited by Anna Winterbottom, Victoria Dickenson, Ben Cartwright, and McGill librarian Lauren Williams, was released by McGill-Queens University Press. Elizabeth Gwillim (1763-1807) and her sister Mary Symonds (1772-1854) lived in Madras (now Chennai) from 1801 to 1807. Despite their brief stay, their artwork and correspondence offer a rare glimpse into the natural and social landscapes of the city during this period. Elizabeth Gwillim is particularly renowned for her large-scale bird paintings, preserved in McGill's Blacker-Wood Natural History Collection. Elizabeth's sister Mary Symonds produced landscapes and portraits, with 78 of her works housed at the South Asia Museum in Norwich. Their detailed letters, sent to their mother in Hereford and their sister in London, are held in four volumes at the British Library.

The rich legacy left by Gwillim and Symonds has enabled scholars to piece together a vivid portrait of their lives as female naturalists in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. The book is a culmination of the Gwillim Project, a SSHRC-funded initiative led by Professor Victoria Dickenson at McGill's Rare Books and Special Collections. This project united an international team of scholars, practitioners, and students from disciplines such as art history, architecture, ornithology, botany, museum studies, and the history of environment, textiles, and food.




